This part of the business was dropped when the store was remodeled and the sales area expanded around 1963.

An important part of the Gil's Market service is meat processing and the operation of as many as 200 lockers.

Mrs. Guilford, the former Nadine Rodewald of Central City, assists her husband in the operation of the store.

In addition to providing the groceries for the Hordville area, Merlin serves as the chairman of the Hordville Village Board. He is a past commander of the Hordville American Legion Post. He also served on the Hordville School Board.

In his spare time, Merlin enjoys a round of golf on the Valley View or other area golf courses.

The Guilford children have all helped in the operation of the Market.

Carla is now Mrs. Randy Fowler. They have one child, Misti Jo, and make their home in Hordville.

Myla is a student in Rockmont College in Denver.

Kevin and Ko Ann are both freshmen in Hordville High School. They are twins.

The Friday and Saturday celebration included coffee and a variety of sandwiches, cookies and donuts for everybody that stopped at the store.
